INTRODUCTION: It has been said that what man has gained through

Christ is far greater than what he lost through Adam. The Bible emphasizes the glory of man which has come through salvation. No where is this expressed (MY) clearer than in the last words of verse 12-- "Which things the angels desire to look into." Many people believe that when we get to heaven we will become angels. But what we have now and then is enough to make the angels them selves, who have seen all the splendor of God through all eternity, gaze upon us with great interest. It portrays one stooping and stretching the neck to gaze on some wonderful sight. The word "look" means literally to "look from the side," and shows that the angels contemplate salvation from without, as spectators, not as participants. What is it that the angels are gazing at?

I. THEY DESIRE TO LOOK INTO OUR INHERITANCE.

(Verses 3,4,5)

We are heirs to a spiritual estate. It signifies a gift of God to His chosen people. In the Old Testament, it is the Promised Land, in the New, it is a possession viewed in one sense as a present possession, and in another as future. It emphasizes salvation as a gift. Our inheritance in the heavenly kingdom in all its glory.

The little baby lying in the crib does not fully realize the inheritance that is his -- we are the same way.

The source of our inheritance is the New Birth. Verse 3. a settled secure procession

An inheritance is a heritage which one receives by virtue of birth or by a special gift. As God's sons, we are His heirs, and have by birth come into an inheritance.

This new life, new birth took place in accord with His great mercy. He took pity upon us in our condition and raised us from where we were to an entirely different state.

(1) Incorruptible. It belongs to the future world and is apart from this corruptible world. It is an imperishable possession. It is beyond the reach of death. No grave will ever be dug on this estate.

(2) It is Undefiled. It is pure in a moral sense, imply-separation from the sinful world. It is beyond the taint of sin. Sin has ruined most things in thislife.

- 3. The certainity of our inheritance.

Expressed in two ways.

- (1) "Reserved in heaven..." To keep watch over, keep undisturbed, unharmed--opposite of lose. In the perfect tense: Has been guarded, is being guraded, will always be guarded. It has been reserved from beginning to the end. Eternity is in the word. And it is God who keeps it.
- (2) "For you, who are kept..." To hold in custody-a military word-to build a wall around.

We are amid enemies who are bent on robbing us of our inheritance. Again a perfect part. a continuous process of protection. The inheritance itself is safe and we are likewise guarded for the inheritance.

"Through faith -- Faith that trusts the guarding power of God. In every danger our faith turns to God.

"Unto salvation." This is the final result of God's keeping. "Ready..." Not about to, but prepared, accomplished. Right now we are prepared. There is no more that we must do.

II. THEY DESIRE TO LOOK INTO OUR TRIALS. (Verses 6,7)
