A few years ago a book was written which sought to take Christ from His rightful place. The title of the book was

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Very little true worship is done - how to worship

The Sun and the Umbrellas, and in it the author stated that Christ was an umbrella which hid God from us. To be sure, the book is to be shunned by all who love Christ but there is a suggestion for us. Is it not possible that we have become so accustomed to the forms of worship that they may be serving as umbrellas hiding us from true worship? It is very possible that we can wrongly emphasize the forms of worship and find ourselves worshipping beauty and art rather than God.

This is a very real danger. The only safeguard against such a thing happening to us is to discover what constitutes true worship. There is nothing wrong with form; preparation and organization are necessary. But the principles of true worship must rise above the forms of worship.

In the passage before us are revealed in the experience of Moses the principles of true Worship. His place of worship was a holy place; God was there and spoke to him. But it was on a desert mountain while Moses was keeping sheep. This experience of worship was so great and meaningful that it changed the entire course of his life. This is the type of worship we desire; life-changing experiences with God. Let us learn from this passage how we may have such a worship experience.
