 - 1. Proposition: The natural course for the obedient child of God is a life devoted to following Him in all places and at all times.

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- 2. Specific Objective: To give encouragement and edification to those who strive to conduct their lives according to God's leadership.
- VI. Introduction: The life of the Christian is the life of a pilgrim. The Apostle Peter says that we are pilgrims and sojourners; we are strangers in this world, our true citizenship being in heaven. Jesus prayed that his followers might be in the world but not of the world. We are to be in the world, discharging our duties as such, but at the same time realizing that we are to look upon this world as a thing passing away and not to be held on to. We are to set our affections on things above where Christ is. He is our life, and our thoughts, affections, and ambitions are to be centered in Him.

This is graphically illustrated in the experience of Israel as God led them out of Egypt into the Promised Land. To them Egypt was the place of bondage and oppression, the place of the world as opposed to Canaan,

the placehofeGod's blessings and perfect will. They had believed Moses and took their flight from Egypt in obedience to God. From Egypt to Canaan was not one step.
