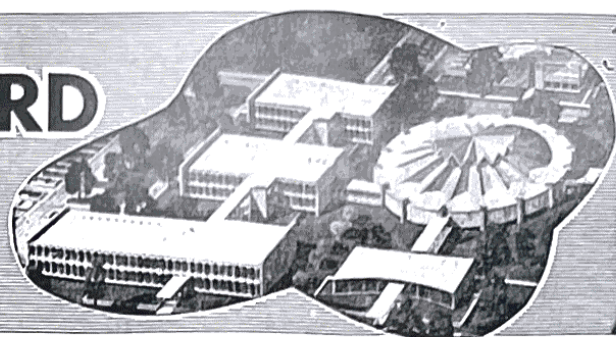

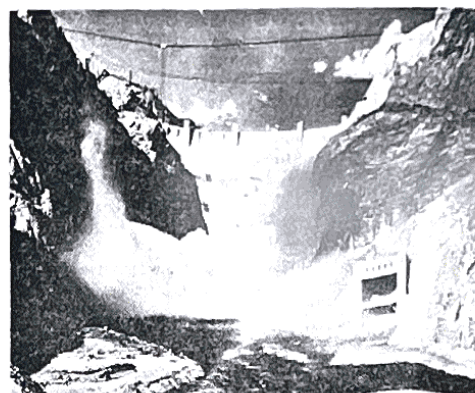

HOOVER DAM

Damming the Colorado River just southeast of Las Vegas, the Hoover Dam is one of the largest structures of its kind in the world. Finished in 1935, the dam is 727 feet high and 1,282 feet wide. Used for hydroelectric power, flood control and irrigation, it is the key unit of the projects on the Colorado River. The reservoir created by the dam, Lake Mead, is the world's largest man-made lake and a popular vacation area.
